The Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) program was officially launched as a national, community based movement in July 2002. It was formed in response to President Bush's call for all Americans to offer volunteer service in their communities.

The purpose of the **MRC** Program is to strengthen communities by using their expertise to promote public health throughout the year as well **during times of emergency**.

The MRC Program is a specialized function of Cupertino's Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program.

Both are components of Citizen Corps, a national network of volunteers dedicated to making sure the families, homes, and communities are safe from terrorism, crime, and disasters of all kinds. Citizen Corps is part of the President's USA Freedom Corps

What do MRC Volunteers Do?

MRC volunteers work in coordination with existing local emergency response programs.

Medical Professionals familiarize themselves with the City's disaster response plans and emergency medical supplies stored around the City. Minimum participation requires a 1 hour orientation session and providing emergency contact information. Additional training is available.

CERT Volunteers participate in the medical response by receiving free advanced first aid training and providing first aid support at community events.
