Subject: Fiscal Year 2020-21 CIP Status Report and Adopted Fiscal Year 2021-22 CIP

I am pleased to provide you the following comprehensive document that includes descriptions and the status of currently budgeted projects as well as proposed projects in the categories described later in this letter. This document guides the City in the funding and scheduling of improvement projects over multiple years. The CIP does not include routine infrastructure maintenance efforts such paving or concrete improvements; you will find these located in the approved operating budget.

Impacts of COVID-19 on Deferred and Active FY20/21 CIP Projects

When the March 2020 shelter in place order was issued by Santa Clara County, several CIP projects were in various stages of implementation. The McClellan Ranch Preserve Community Gardens project had been awarded for construction and many of other projects, including but not limited to, Regnart Creek Trail, Linda Vista Trail, McClellan Avenue Separated Bike Lane Project Phase 2 and Bubb Separated Bike Lane Project were in various phases of design. All these projects did experience some delays to COVID-19 due to the lag in understanding of what services were and were not essential. In general, schedules for these projects on average slipped six weeks.

Four projects were deferred in FY20/21. Deferral of two projects was directly due to the impacts of COVID-19 and the other two projects due to the unknown financial conditions that could have resulted from COVID-19. Each project deferred was in consideration of the top priority of health and safety. These projects are as follows:

- All-Inclusive Play Area at Jollyman Park
 - Full funding of the project requires approximately \$1M in fund raising. Raising these funds in a pandemic environment was not practical. This project will resume in FY21-22.
- Bike Boulevard Improvements Phases 1-3 (Permanent Improvements)
 - Physical outreach to residents was not practical and implementation of pop-up style improvements was desired to evaluate effectiveness and to determine if permanent improvements are necessary. Implementation of the Interim Improvements will continue in Fy21-22.
- Orange Avenue Sidewalks
 - o Only the construction of the sidewalks was deferred, and acquisition of needed right-of-way (ROW) continued. Byrne Avenue (immediate parallel to Orange Avenue) sidewalk improvements were completed in FY19/20. Completion of this

work significantly improved walking in the Tri-School area. Design and ROW acquisition process will resume in FY21-22

- Stevens Creek Corridor Park Chain Master Plan McClellan to Stevens Creek Boulevard
 - o Project is awaiting the completion of the BBF Golf Course Alternatives Analysis.

Council has deferred the funding for the "Interim City Hall" project until a strategy and conceptual plan for the improvements to the City Hall building are defined. The "New City Hall" project will be defunded in FY21-22 in lieu of a new project to plan for the renovation of City Hall.

Prior to the economic uncertainties created by COVID-19, the General Fund transferred significant amounts to the Capital Reserve fund on an annual basis. For the last five years, these amounts were as follows:

- FY20-21 \$5,000,000
- FY19-20 \$10,000,000
- FY18-19 \$8,000,000
- FY17-18 \$10,000,000
- FY16-17 \$15,000,000

At this point, no transfers from the General Fund to the Capital Reserve fund are forecasted for the next five years. Although the City's positive sales tax experience during the pandemic has mitigated much of the financial impacts of COVID-19, much uncertainty remains as we move towards recovery and what that will mean specifically for Cupertino. With the current financial uncertainty, it is not feasible to make funding recommendations for a 10-year CIP. Additionally, since it is unknown how COVID-19 related economic uncertainties will impact City budgets and what emergency projects may arise, it is recommended that the Capital Reserve account maintain a minimum funded balance of \$2 million.

Master Plans and Asset Management Plans

Master Plans and Asset Management Plans continue to guide how we improve our city's infrastructure and facilities. The Storm Drain Master Plan, ADA Transition Plan, Citywide Building Condition Assessment, Citywide Parks and Recreation Master Plan, Bicycle Transportation Plan, Pedestrian Master Plan, School Walk Audit, and the Green Infrastructure Plan are essential references when determining scope and vision for the new and existing CIP projects. Many of our current projects are identified as priorities in these adopted master plans or will be proposed in future years.

Divergent Focus for the New Projects

This year's CIP has 15 new projects: four are Facilities projects, three are Bike/Pedestrian pathways projects, three are Streets and Infrastructure focused, and five are rooted in the Parks and Recreation System.

Newly proposed projects are listed below:

Fund Types for CIP

Tax Supported Funds

Capital Improvement Fund (General Fund)

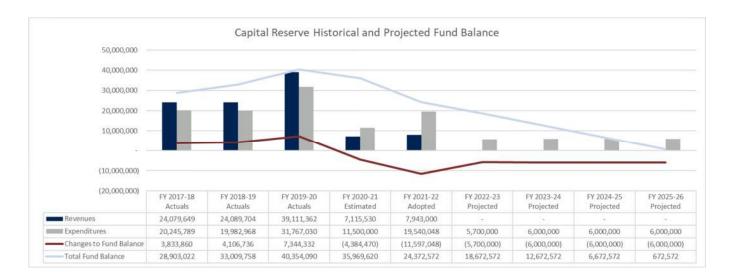
The General Fund is the primary operating fund for governmental services. Within the General Fund, the Capital Improvement Fund is utilized for the acquisition or construction of major capital facilities. A copy of the Capital Improvement Policy is attached at the end of this letter.

Capital Reserve (General Fund)

The City's Capital Reserve is intended to be used for capital improvement projects in the City. Funding for this reserve is governed by the City's Assigned and Unassigned Fund Balance and Use of One Time Funds Policy that can be found in the Financial Policies and Schedules section of the City's proposed and final budget documents. Per that policy, any unassigned fund balance in the General Fund at year-end over \$500,000 will be transferred to the Capital Reserve.

The Capital Improvement Fund and Capital Reserve are projected to end FY20-21 with approximately \$36.0 million in fund balance primarily due to \$32.1 million in outstanding amended appropriations for projects yet to be completed that will be carried out into FY21-22. As of July 1, 2021, the Capital Improvement Fund and Capital Reserve had approximately \$43.5 million in unspent appropriations that, if spent, would result in an estimated available fund balance of \$0.6 million for future unfunded projects.

Changes to fund balance are derived by taking any projected transfer in from the General Fund (assumes at \$0 for the forecast period) and then subtracting total funded project costs for that fiscal year. Based on the FY 21-22 Proposed Capital Improvement Program and the General Fund Five Year Forecast, the following chart shows historical actuals and projected estimates for the next five years for the Capital Improvement Program and Capital Reserve.



Stevens Creek Corridor Park Capital Projects

This fund pays for the design and construction of the Stevens Creek Corridor Park projects.

Special Revenue Funds

Storm Drain Improvement Fund

This fund pays for the construction and maintenance of storm drain facilities. Revenues are collected as a line item on the city's behalf via the County property tax billing.

Park Dedication Fund

This fund pays for the activity granted by the business and professions code of the State of California in accordance with the open space and conservation element of the City's General Plan. Revenues are collected as a development "in-lieu" fee with new residential development, excluding exempted ADU's per state regulation and designated Below Market Rate Housing (BMR).

Transportation Fund

This fund pays for expenditures related to the maintenance and construction of City streets. Revenues are collected from Vehicle License Fees, Gas Tax, Cal Recycle State Grant funding (for rubberized payement) as well as SB1 dollars.

Transportation Impact Fee

This fund pays for the cost of transportation improvements required to serve new development. Impact fees are one-time charges on new development, additions to existing structures, change in use, or similar construction activity that requires a building permit and results in additional peak hour vehicle trips, and is collected and used by the City to cover the cost of capital facilities and infrastructure that are required to serve new growth.

Housing & Community Development

This fund pays for the Federal Housing and Community Development Grant Program activities administered by the City. This fund also pays for activities related to the Below Market Rate Housing Program. Revenues are collected as a development "in-lieu" fee with new residential development, excluding exempted ADU's per state regulation and designated Below Market Rate Housing (BMR).

Enterprise Funds

Blackberry Farm Golf Course Fund

This fund pays for operating costs related to the Blackberry Farm Golf Course. Revenues are collected as fees from users of the golf course.

Sports Center Fund

This fund pays for operating costs related to the Sports Center. Revenues are collected as fees from users of the Sports Center.

Recreation Programs Fund

This fund pays for operating costs related to the City's community centers and park facilities. Revenues are collected as fees for recreation programs at the City's community centers and park facilities.

Priorities

As a tool to help make decisions about funding and the scheduling of resources, each project was prioritized using the following criteria:

- a. New Projects
 - i. City Council Priority
 - ii. Health and Safety Improvements
 - iii. Identified as priority in adopted master plan, building condition assessment or study.
 - iv. Projects in response to Community input and ongoing usage; projects on hold that need to be re-activated; or ongoing phases
 - v. Exigent Project (Grant Opportunity, Limited Outside funding availability)
- b. Existing Projects
 - i. Ongoing, funded projects from prior year CIP programs.
 - ii. Projects with incomplete/inadequate funding sources or delayed funding that may require additional funding to continue.

- Annual Playground Replacement

<u>Category 3 - Existing Projects - Completely Funded (To be carried over)</u>

These projects are funded in the current year budget but are not complete, so existing funding will be carried over without augmentation. Refer to the category schedule in the current CIP budget for a full listing of projects.

<u>Category 4 - Existing Projects – Externally Funded (To be carried over)</u>

These projects are funded in the current year budget but are not complete, so existing funding – both City Funding and External Funding -- will be carried over without augmentation, unless otherwise noted in the project narrative. Refer to the category schedule in the current CIP budget for a full listing of projects.

Project Cost Estimates

Following are the project description and budget sheets for the five-year CIP budget plan. The estimated project costs shown are inclusive of all anticipated direct and indirect costs, including for administration and management of the project, design, community outreach, permits, construction management and inspections, internal cost allocation, and the construction contract.

FISCAL POLICIES - Capital Improvement Policy

PURPOSE

To establish a Capital Improvement Policy to assist in future planning.

SCOPE

All anticipated Capital Improvement Projects for the current fiscal year plus four additional fiscal years.

POLICY

The City will prepare and update a five-year Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) encompassing all City facilities

Projects included in the CIP will have complete information on the need for the project (project justification), description and scope of work, total cost estimates, future operating and maintenance costs and how the project will be funded.

An objective process for evaluating CIP projects with respect to the overall needs of the City will be established through a priority ranking of CIP projects. The ranking of projects will be used to allocate resources to ensure priority projects are completed effectively and efficiently.

Changes to the CIP such as addition of new projects, changes in scope and costs of a project or reprioritization of projects will require City Manager and City Council approval.

The City will maintain its physical assets at a level adequate to protect the City's capital investment and to minimize future operating maintenance and replacement costs. The City recognizes that deferred maintenance increases future capital costs, thus placing a burden on future residents. Therefore, the budget will provide for adequate maintenance and the orderly replacement of capital plant and equipment from current revenues when possible.

The City will determine the least costly funding method for its capital projects and will obtain grants, contributions and low cost state or federal loans whenever possible.

The City will utilize "pay-as-you-go" funding for capital improvement expenditures considered recurring, operating or maintenance in nature. The City may also utilize "pay-as-you-go" funding for capital improvements when current revenues and adequate fund balances are available or when issuing debt would adversely affect the City's credit rating.

The City will consider the use of debt financing for capital projects under the following circumstances:

- When the project's useful life will exceed the terms of the financing
- When resources are deemed sufficient and reliable to service the long-term debt
- When market conditions present favorable interest rates for City financing
- When the issuance of debt will not adversely affect the City's credit rating and debt coverage ratios.
